Flood Disaster Relief Bill Helps Washington County

Last Monday, Rep. Fenton reports, the House passed Senate File 1, a bill that provides \$17 million for recovery efforts in the wake of last summer's flooding, which was severe enough to elicit a federal disaster declaration. Three tribal government and 47 counties, including Washington County, submitted requests for relief and were included in the bill.

During the 5th century the Emperor Gelasius publicly honored the martyr.

Today it is estimated that for St. Valentine's Day, more than on any other holiday in the calendar, \$220 million dollars is spent on roses and four billion on jewelery, with couple often becoming engaged on 14th February.

It is easy to forget that this date can also be a time of sadness for some. Just thinking of my life, last year a member of my home AA group committed suicide on this date. On a happier note, on February 14th, 1981, I stopped drinking and started my journey of recovery.
